The NISWMD is Working to Keep Our Waterways Free of Debris

The City of Angola/Trine University MS4 is excited to report that the Northeast Indiana Solid Waste Management District (NISWMD) has expanded its recycling program this year to include new items. The NISWMD is now accepting shredded paper, Styrofoam, and boat wrap. These items can now be recycled for minimal fees under the following conditions:

Shredded paper is accepted in any size bag and can be delivered in paper or plastic bags since this item must be unloaded by NISWMD personnel upon arrival. Employees of the NISWMD kindly ask that LOOSE SHREDDED PAPER, AS WELL AS BAGGED SHREDDED PAPER, NEVER BE PLACED DIRECTLY IN THE RECYCLE BINS.

Styrofoam recycling has the same protocol. All types of Styrofoam are accepted as long as NISWMD employees receive the Styrofoam upon arrival and LOOSE STYROFOAM, AS WELL AS BAGGED STYROFOAM, IS NEVER PLACED DIRECTLY IN THE RECYCLE BINS.

Plastic boat wrap is now accepted with the same recycling stipulations as shredded paper and Styrofoam items.

The district has provided significant solid waste reduction services and programs to the residents of Steuben, DeKalb, LaGrange, and Noble Counties for over three decades. Every year the NISWMD recycles tons of household hazardous waste, yard waste, and residential solid waste, also known as household trash. Residents of the four-county are lucky to have multiple convenience centers located throughout the four-county area. The residents of the city of Angola are fortunate to have recycling provided; however, the NISWMD may supplement the city-provided services as recycling services are not always equal. You may find that the NISWMD may accept items your local recycling company does not. If not, you are encouraged to take advantage of potential additional services, as well as the convenience of the NISWMD's many locations.

Here are some helpful tips when taking advantage of the NISWMD recycling service:

- DO NOT fill recycle bins with unaccepted items. This takes up valuable space for items
 that are accepted, making it difficult for others to easily recycle as intended. Placing
 unaccepted items in bins also takes time, energy, and money to sort them back out.
- Don't worry about sorting! Items approved for placement in the recycling bins can now go in the same bin. This is known as "single-stream recycling".
- At this time, the recycling industry is saying that lids can be left on all bottles and jars, such as milk jugs, prescription bottles and cosmetic jars. This DOES NOT include pumps and sprayers.

- Leave those labels! Labels no longer must be removed from plastic bottles, glass jars, or metal cans.
- Don't worry about the leftover wax in candle jars!! They are accepted regardless.
- Don't want to look at your junk mail? That's approved for recycling, too. Unopened junk mail is accepted and can be placed directly in the recycling bins.
- All light bulbs are accepted for a minimal fee as part of the district's Household Hazardous Waste program. Again, DO NOT place them in the recycling bins. Household hazardous waste along with old electronics are accepted every Friday from 8 am to Noon.

Still have questions? Call the district at 260-587-3063. Please pass along this updated recycling information. Every item the NISWMD recycles is one less that has the potential to end up in our local waterways. By participating in local efforts, you protect our local water resources!!

Well, it's not, but due to stringent deadline restraints we'll pretend it is. Last Fall was wonderful with leaf peeping boat rides occurring all the way to Thanksgiving weekend. With the early open water, the buoy deployment and swan eggoiling got an early start too. However, starry stonewort remains problematic and was treated twice from a provided federal grant. Also, utilizing JLA reserved funds we started having test areas treated for Purple Loosestrife and Phragmites. More to come next year on the results of those treatments. The August Annual Membership meeting was very poorly attended. Only 10 people were present, mostly board members. One could think the lack of attendance could be due to the fact the Stueben County Lake Council had their annual meeting at the same time. But we've come to find out that meeting wasn't very well attended either. It's a paradox that as the number of boaters and the use of the lake(s) increases it seems that the volunteer base and people involved to manage the lakes is decreasing. From reading the articles some of the other Steuben County lakes it is apparent that many

Summer activities will conclude with our Poker Run on September 4.

We also continued cooperating with the Steuben County Lakes Council to maintain water testing to monitor for pollutants with potential for human disease. Thanks to all Council members and its leadership for this important work.

In closing, our Association sends sincere thanks to our many volunteers who gave so generously of their time and talents to sponsor fun activities, as well as their efforts to keep our lake clean and safe!

Water Quality Committee Report - Steuben County SWQMP

Beginning in the early 2000s, the Steuben County Lakes Council (SCLC) responded to water quality concerns by supporting annual summer water quality monitoring of over 60 sites that include major lakes and some tributaries flowing into and out of various lakes in Steuben County. One of its partner agencies, The City of Angola/Trine University, MS4 (COA/TU MS4) program, monitors several sites along tributaries and regulated drains that flow through industrial and urbanized areas of Angola, then outfall into the lakes monitored by the SCLC program. The data collected revealed the extent of the E. coli issue in the county, but the data provided limited insight into the cause(s) of the problem. In response to the need for more robust water quality data, vested stakeholders from the SCLC, COA/TU MS4, Steuben County Health Department (HD), Steuben County Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD), St. Joseph River Basin Commission (SJRBC), Michiana Area Council of Governments (MACOG), AmeriCorps, and Trine University formed a committee with the goal to initiate a strategic water quality monitoring program in June 2023 to identify the sources of E. coli, nutrients, and sediment in surface waters. Each of these organizations share a strong sense of stewardship to protect water resources not just for Steuben County but for communities living downstream.

The monitoring program collects a suite of water quality information from 10 surface water sites throughout Steuben County on a weekly basis for 20 weeks (through October). The water quality monitoring involves the use of a portable water quality meter. The HydroLab HL7 Multiparameter Sonde, manufactured by OTT HydroMet. Monitoring also involves the collection of water samples for laboratory analysis, including samples being sent to the Indiana State Department of Health to determine/measure the presence/absence of caffeine. Caffeine levels are being monitored at all sites as part of a pilot project to determine the feasibility of using caffeine as a cost-effective indicator of potential sewage contamination.

101 Lakes Trust - Hepworth recognized by 101 Lakes Trust

The 101 Lakes Trust paid tribute to one of its founders during its annual meeting Wednesday in the Wild Turkey Shelter at Trine State Recreation Area.

Betty-Lee Hepworth, who died March 26 at 89 years old, assisted in the creation of the 101 Lakes Trust – an offshoot of the Steuben County Lake Council – in 2004 and was chosen to serve as its president in 2005. Since its founding, the 101 Lakes Trust has organized educational events and worked to preserve landscapes in Steuben County.

Its first efforts included paving the way for the purchase and protection of Trine State Recreation Area.

"The question is not that things change, but how they change," Hepworth said in an article in the Herald-Republican documenting the founding of the 101 Lakes Trust.

Wednesday, 101 Lakes Trust board President Janet Albright presented Hepworth's son, Tammeron Jones-Francis, with the third annual Environmental Visionary Award. The first recipient was Ryan Matthews, who has established several conservation easements on Steuben County lakes, including two recent easements at Lake Pleasant. The second recipient was Pete Hippensteel, a retired Tri-State University professor and founding member of the Steuben County Lakes Council.

Hepworth's award read: "101 Lakes Trust recognizes Betty-Lee Hepworth as an environmental visionary and co-founder of the 101 Lakes Trust. Her creative insight and unfaltering service led to the preservation of many lakes and lands in Steuben County."

Hepworth's parents, Frank and Elizabeth, bought a slice of property along the Seven Sisters Lakes, adjacent to what is now Trine State Recreation Area, in 1940.

"After Betty-Lee's parents' death in the 1990s and her own acquisition of the property, having observed rampant changes in the area, Betty-Lee's interest in preserving the surrounding land-scape and this bit of property piqued," wrote Jones-Francis in a biography of his mother, which will be published in its entirety in the Summer/Fall edition of the 101 Lakes Trust newsletter, Reflections. "Yet, to be sure, caring for landscapes didn't begin with the property. Preservation and beauty were important to her throughout her life and her career in architecture. As a child she would walk in her Detroit neighborhood and imaginatively change the facade of houses to something that better suited her, the street, and other houses."

She attended the University of Miami in Ohio and was one only a handful of women in the 1950s to graduate with a degree in architecture and master's degree in city planning.

"Her life-long interest in history and preservation, however, was inspired by professor Ernest Connally," said Jones-Francis. Connally contributed preservation policy to both the United Nations and the National Park Service.

Hepworth was remembered fondly by members of the 101 Lakes Trust board during Wednesday's annual meeting, when essay contest winners were also recognized. They included first-place adult Ashlee Hoos, second-place Paul Beckwith and third-place Raegan Wright. Victoria Dohner won in the youth category.

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We were able to hold a Kid's Fishing Tournament this July. Many thanks go out to the local businesses that sponsored this event and the volunteers that organized this!

Because of the tireless efforts of a few volunteers, we should finally be getting our silt trap dredging project completed. From their efforts, the Big Turkey Lake Conservancy, Inc. was established and will help secure much needed funding for this project. With this funding and the project's LARE Grant, we are hopeful to start dredging by the end of the year. We applied for a permit from the DNR and are currently waiting on their approval.

Although summer is winding down, we look forward to the recreation our lake provides us through the colder seasons.

CLEAR LAKE LAND CONSERVANCY

Clear Lake Township Land Conservancy renewed a Clear Lake tradition this year – the Fun Run – on July 8th. For the first time, the Fun Run included a Fun Day, a chance for people to learn more about the Conservancy and what it does. There was a DJ playing upbeat music, a bounce house for the kids, a scavenger hunt at Koeneman Lake Preserve, face painting, CLTLC swag, Beached Boys food truck, demonstrations, and water quality experts. The event was made possible by local sponsors, and with a successful year – despite the rain – planning has begun for next year's run.

The Fun Run featured not just a 10K (running around Clear Lake is a perfect 6.2-mile course) but also a 5K race and a one-mile walk. The race was an almost 50-year tradition started by the Buehrer family, continued for many years by the Clear Lake Lions Club until COVID-19 canceled it and renewed by the Conservancy.

"We thought it was important to get the community together to enjoy nature, get some exercise and learn about the work of the Conservancy," said event coordinator Barb Wenger, vice president of the CLTLC board.

Fun Day added some flair and fanfare. It also gave area residents an opportunity to chat with Scott Banfield of Aquatic Enhancement and Survey about how invasive water plants are treated. Also on hand was Jerry Sweeten of EcoSystems Connections Institute, which is administering a multi-year watershed diagnostic study at Clear Lake.

"We deemed the event a success by hearing the 'buzz' in the community after the event and by seeing the smiles on the faces of the winners of the races and the families having fun together," Wenger said.

With 186 runners, four trophy winners and numerous age group medal winners, the participants, though soggy after the rainy run, were enthusiastic. Runners are encouraged to attend next year's event on Saturday, July 13, 2024. Sponsors are being sought. The proceeds – \$58,000 this year – benefit the Conservancy's work. Its mission is to preserve, protect and manage the natural environment within the Clear Lake Watershed and Township for future generations.
